



That's why transparency is a cornerstone of how we operate—from how we spend funds to how we measure impact. We undergo regular governmental monitoring and independent audits and hold ourselves accountable to the communities we serve.



Similar to VACAP, NCAP is the national membership organization that supports Community Action Agencies across the US. NCAP offers training, technical assistance and other resources to strengthen agencies like Tri-County.



Virginia Community Action Partnership

VACAP is Virginia's membership association for the 31 Community Action Agencies statewide. VACAP supports, audits and builds the capacity of these agencies so they can best serve their clients.



VIRGINIA DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES

VDSS is Virginia's official state administrator for the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG). This federal grant funds anti-poverty work in underresourced communities throughout the US. As our regulatory agency, VDSS distributes federal funds to agencies and is responsible for monitoring, auditing and compliance—including fiscal oversight, performance reviews and on-site evaluations.



To receive and remain eligible for the CSBG, we must adhere to

58

standards spanning categories such as organizational leadership, financial oversight, data and analysis, and community engagement.



Setting the stage for success starts before our newest neighbors are even born.

From nurturing healthy pregnancies through our Infant & Maternal Health program to providing a safe, enriching start in Head Start classrooms and connecting youth with caring mentors through our Mentor Role Model program, we're there for our community members at every stage. Our goal is simple but powerful: to surround each family with the care, guidance and resources they need to thrive. When children and families have opportunities, the possibilities are endless—no matter where their story began.

INFANT & MATERNAL HEALTH

Every parent deserves to feel safe, supported and empowered on their journey to parenthood. But in rural areas like ours, that journey poses unique challenges. Hospitals that deliver babies are few and far between—often more than 45 minutes away—and for families in rural communities, that distance can mean the difference between life and death. Nationally, women of color are already dying in childbirth at alarming rates. The Center for Disease Control reported that in 2023, the maternal mortality rate for Black women was 50.3 deaths per 100,000 live births—a significant jump from the rates for white (14.5), Hispanic (12.4) and Asian (10.7) women. But in areas like ours, everyone faces an increased risk due to lack of access. That's why our Infant & Maternal Health Program is more than just a service—it's a lifeline.



We help families create personalized emergency delivery plans—because when labor starts at 2 a.m., the preparation beforehand makes all the difference. We’re also expanding access to doulas across our region to ensure families have trusted local support when medical help is far away. With support from the Southern Virginia Higher Education Center, we’re helping develop a local doula certification program to grow the care our clients need right here at home.

Our care doesn’t end at birth—it continues through those tender early years when support matters most. Tri-County walks alongside families during the postpartum stage and

beyond, offering guidance, encouragement and connection. Whether it’s sharing lifesaving skills like CPR, supporting breastfeeding or teaching safe sleep practices, we’re here to help parents feel confident and empowered. Through in-person and virtual home visits, our compassionate community health workers offer thoughtful, research-based conversations that celebrate each family’s strengths and help them navigate challenges. Because when we support families during these critical years, we’re not just changing one life—we’re planting the seeds for stronger, healthier generations to come.


HEAD START



At TCCAA, Head Start is more than a preschool—it's a launchpad for lifelong learning. Originally operating independently, this program became part of Tri-County in 1984 and has been a powerful collaboration ever since. Now in its 60th year, Head Start has stood the test of time—changing lives, strengthening families and proving that education can be one of the most powerful tools we have to fight poverty.

In various locations across Halifax and Mecklenburg counties, children ages three to five engage in high-quality early learning while receiving vital health and developmental screenings. Many of these children may otherwise enter kindergarten without ever having been in a classroom or having access to consistent support—but thanks to Head Start, they walk through those doors ready to learn, with families who are ready to advocate for them. When intervention is needed for health and development, it's timely and supportive.

Head Start in Action: Creating a Thriving Life for Families


When three-year-old Morgan walked into TCCAA’s Boydton Head Start Center for the very first time, his mother, Jamenia Baskerville, couldn’t hold back the tears. As an older mom raising an only child, she knew this was more than just the first day of preschool. It was the first step toward something bigger—helping Morgan build friendships, gain confidence and preparing them both for the years ahead.

“I knew my three-year-old son needed a more structured routine to be ready for kindergarten—and so did I,” Jamenia said. “Yes, I cried when he left that first day, but I knew it was the right thing to do.”

At Boydton Head Start, Morgan quickly discovered a world beyond his tablet screen. With encouragement from his teachers, storytime became a nightly ritual between mother and son.

“We’d read stories at bedtime and sometimes make up our own,” Jamenia said. “I was so happy when he stopped looking at that tablet so much. Now he loves reading and even has his own bookshelf full of books!”



Like many families, Jamenia chose Head Start because of friends who shared how it gave their children a strong foundation. But she soon realized it offered much more. With six centers across Mecklenburg and Halifax counties, TCCAA's Head Start program is designed not only for child development and early education but also for family growth and stability. Parents are active partners in the process, setting whole-family goals that might include career advancement, financial planning or strengthening routines at home.

For Morgan, the results were clear. By the time he entered kindergarten, he was already reading at age five, writing his name and even learning math skills like counting, adding and sequencing. But academics were only part of the picture.

"They took trips to the library, fire department, sheriff's office, the county fair, a park in Danville and the Metro Zoo in Richmond," Jamenia said. "They even taught the kids how to sit still and how to get on and off a bus."

These experiences helped Morgan grow into a more responsible, confident child.

"He picks up after himself now because he learned it at Head Start," Jamenia said. "He's also more social. He started baseball at four, and now he's playing football."

One of her proudest moments came when Morgan received Head Start's "How to Be a Friend" award.

"He was so proud of himself—and so was I," Jamenia said with a smile.

But the impact didn't stop with Morgan. Jamenia felt supported, too, as Head Start worked with her to strengthen routines and prepare for her son's transition to kindergarten. This whole-family approach reflects TCCAA's vision: to create a region where all people live a thriving life.

"I'm a huge advocate for Head Start and tell other parents I know to send their children," Jamenia said.

What began with tears on that first day of preschool has blossomed into pride, responsibility and resilience — a foundation that will carry both Morgan and the Baskerville-Bell family forward for years to come.

MENTOR ROLE MODEL PROGRAM



Founded by community members in 2000 before joining Tri-County in 2019, our Mentor Role Model Program is more than just guidance—it's a lifeline for at-risk youth in Halifax County. For young people who've been told what they can't do, this program offers something life-changing: someone who believes they *can*. Here, mentees gain more than support—they gain a vision of who they can become.

Equipped with comprehensive training, our mentors serve as steady voices and trusted allies. They walk alongside mentees through life's ups and downs, modeling effective behaviors while providing a listening ear. Along the way, mentees make healthier choices, build stronger relationships and imagine futures they hadn't thought possible. As these youth grow into thriving adults, they pour this hope back into the same communities that raised them. When you invest in mentorship, you're not just helping one child today—you're building the next generation of leaders.



Emergency Services at Tri-County Community Action Agency is more than a safety net—it's a glimmer of hope in someone's hardest moment. When families face an empty pantry, a looming eviction or the trauma of escaping abuse, they come to us in crisis—and we meet them with compassion, urgency and unwavering support. Emergency Services unites several essential services under one umbrella, offering fast, focused help when individuals and families are at their most vulnerable. From warm meals to safe places to sleep to advocates who truly listen, our team offers a path forward. We don't just meet immediate needs—we give people time to breathe, rebuild and believe that brighter days lie ahead. This is where healing begins and futures start to take shape.



Energy Share Program

Energy Share is a last-resort energy assistance program that helps eligible individuals avoid disconnection. Along with bill payment support, the program also provides free energy-efficiency upgrades and educational resources to reduce future energy costs. The program empowers households to stay healthy, secure and economically active—whether that means keeping a job, attending school or simply avoiding costly disruptions. When one household thrives, the whole community benefits.

Serving Hope offers Halifax County residents more than a meal—it offers peace of mind, energy to thrive and a path forward.

Serving Hope became part of TCCAA in 2021, allowing the program to grow and reach even more families in need. It offers monthly food support through USDA provisions, donations and purchased items, ensuring that no one has to choose between feeding their family and meeting other basic needs. That nourishment fuels recipients' bodies and ability to contribute to the community. Serving Hope lives up to its name—offering not just food, but a true sense of belonging and a brighter path forward.

BACKPACK BUDDIES PROGRAM

Just because the school doors close for the weekend doesn't mean our care for children ends. For too many kids, those two days without access to school meals mean empty stomachs and added stress. Backpack Buddies steps in to fill that gap—distributing nutritious, kid-friendly food into backpacks so that children have what they need to feel full, focused and cared for. Food insecurity in childhood can have a lifelong impact on an individual—but so can love, consistency and knowing someone is looking out for them.



VHSP doesn't just reduce homelessness; it restores dignity, creates stability and helps families take the first steps toward lasting independence.

A survivor's journey from trauma to stability is possible with the right care, advocacy and education.

Tri-County's Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Program serves individuals across Halifax, Charlotte, Mecklenburg and Lunenburg counties with comprehensive, empathetic support. From emergency shelter and transportation to crisis intervention, advocacy, and court or medical accompaniment, the program provides immediate and long-term resources to help survivors regain stability and move toward permanent housing.

But the impact doesn't end there. Through community education on topics like dating violence, stalking, bullying and healthy relationships, the program empowers neighbors to become allies, disrupt cycles of abuse, and build a culture of safety and respect. When survivors are supported, communities grow stronger, and the path to lasting change becomes possible.

PICKING UP THE PIECES AFTER TRAGEDY: THE STORY OF MAHALIA TOWNES



In August 2021, tragedy struck the Townes family when Mahalia Townes, a 26-year-old mother described by friends and loved ones as “amicable, good-natured and polite,” was found dead in a hotel room, murdered by the father of her two children.

Mahalia’s death rocked the historic Virginia town of South Boston and her extensive family, who had attempted—with the support of TCCAA’s Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault program—to help her escape the years-long abusive relationship. However, the cycle of abuse continued to pull her back in, and it ultimately led to her death.

But despite the tragic circumstances, Mahalia’s legacy now lives on through a domestic violence shelter. Mahalia’s Place is a TCCAA-run facility that the organization renamed in her honor in April 2025.

The facility is part of TCCAA’s broader domestic violence and sexual assault support system to help women like Mahalia escape abusive relationships by offering financial, emotional and physical support. That aid also extends to others in the abused individual’s circle who may be shouldering the burden of support or who, in the Townes family’s case, may even become targeted by the abuser for interfering.

PICKING UP THE PIECES AFTER TRAGEDY: THE STORY OF MAHALIA TOWNES



"I don't know what I would have done without Tri-County," said Angela Townes-Yancey, a cousin of Mahalia's and now the adoptive mother of Mahalia's two daughters, ages six and four. "I don't think I would have made it through without them."

Angela was part of Mahalia's support network that for eight years tried to help her escape the relationship that ultimately took her life. That included bringing TCCAA to Mahalia's aid where staff members spoke with her regularly, drove her to therapy, and gave her and her children necessary resources, including clothes and a car seat.

And while Mahalia's death serves as a stark reminder of the sometimes inescapable hold and tragic outcomes abusive relationships can have on an individual, TCCAA continued to extend their support to Angela and the Townes family after Mahalia's death and the arrest of her killer. They went with Angela to view Mahalia's body, filled out the paperwork for Angela to receive benefits on Mahalia's behalf and made a house payment for her during the COVID lockdowns. They paid for counseling, and they even cooked meals and dropped them off at Angela's home.

"I still get calls from them regularly," Angela said, more than three years after Mahalia's murder. "Just yesterday, I got a call from Kim to check and see how I was doing. She told me how proud she was of me and all that I've done."

With TCCAA's support, Angela kept her house and a full-time job that allows her to support Mahalia's children, whom Angela and her husband officially adopted. Perhaps most importantly, however, thanks to TCCAA, Angela's family has begun healing from the trauma of Mahalia's death.

"TCCAA has been with me every step of the way," she said. "They're like family. I've always been an advocate of Tri-County, but now I really have to advocate for them because of all they've done. I think the program is such a worthy program."

HOUSING SERVICES

Tri-County's Housing Services program helps families in Halifax and Charlotte counties achieve the dream of safe, stable homeownership. Through the USDA Family Housing Program, qualified applicants can buy, build or refinance modest homes with affordable, fixed-rate financing—even without a down payment. For those needing to make critical repairs, Section 504 Loans and Grants provide funding to modernize heating, wiring or roofing; improve accessibility; or remove health hazards. Together, these resources not only open doors to homeownership but also ensure that existing homes remain safe, livable and sustainable in the long term.

The impact of getting people housed reaches far beyond the individual homeowner. A stable home means a stronger foundation for children to learn and grow, for families to build generational wealth, and for neighborhoods to thrive. Every new mortgage, home repair or renovation ripples through the local economy—supporting construction jobs, increasing property values, and strengthening the tax base that funds schools and services. For individuals, it's transformative; for the community, it's catalytic. Housing stability lays the groundwork for broader economic growth, healthier families and a more resilient region.

CLIENT SPOTLIGHTS



After living in unsafe conditions in a mobile home, the Majeski family moved into temporary housing in 2021. With help from Tri-County, they closed on their very own home in 2025.

62-year-old Linda Caddle survived going through a divorce and cancer. Ms. Caddle believed she was too old to become a homeowner; however, surviving cancer changed her mindset. In 2023, Tri-County began the lengthy process of securing her a USDA Single Family Housing Direct Loan. On September 5, 2025, Ms. Caddle will be celebrating her first year in her new home.

WEATHERIZATION



For many residents, weatherization means the difference between constant worry and lasting relief. Through the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP), Tri-County helps income-eligible residents in Halifax and Charlotte counties reduce energy consumption, lower utility bills and create healthier living environments. From insulation and air sealing to heating system and duct repairs, these upgrades improve both energy efficiency and home safety, saving households an average of \$283 annually. By prioritizing elderly individuals, people with disabilities and families with children, we support those most in need. The benefits extend beyond the home: More efficient energy use contributes to environmental sustainability, and the savings give families room to breathe, invest in other essentials and participate more fully in their communities.

Maintaining a safe, livable home is essential not just for individual well-being, but for building stronger, more connected communities.



VOLUNTEER INCOME TAX ASSISTANCE (VITA) PROGRAM



Financial stability starts with access to the right tools—and sometimes, that begins with a tax return. Through the VITA Program, TCCAA offers free federal and state tax preparation for income-eligible residents in Halifax, Charlotte and Mecklenburg counties. Operating from February through April at locations in South Boston, Chase City and Charlotte Courthouse, VITA ensures that individuals and families receive the full refunds and credits they've earned. These returns can help pay down debt, build savings or cover basic needs—putting money back into households and local economies. By promoting financial empowerment and literacy, VITA strengthens not just individual outcomes but the economic health of entire communities.
